Lower Saluda River – Rising Water Early Warning System

To those who enjoy the recreational aspects of the Lower Saluda River (below the Lake Murray dam) or who know some folks who fish, canoe, kayak, or wade on that stretch of water - - here is an update.

That river water level rises rapidly when SCE&G releases water from Lake Murray in producing hydropower. A normal water flow on the Lower Saluda of about 400 CFS (cubic feet per second) is safe for those in recreation on that stretch of water; but, if SCE&G wants to generate additional electric power - - the flow surges to many times normal flow. In that case, those on the Lower Saluda get in deep trouble – or deep water! A boat could be swamped or those picnicking could get swept off the rocks. Hence the need for the “Rising Water Early Warning System”.

Warning Sirens and Strobe Lights

Warning sirens and strobe lights have been positioned so that most on the Lower Saluda would be alerted when a dangerous high-cubic-foot-per-second surge is about to approach. And SCE&G advises – do not wait when you get that warning – exit the river immediately for your own safety’s sake.

Automatic Phone Calls Warn of the Rising Water

Also, boaters, waders and others who play on the river can get an automatic telephone call warning when its level is set to rise shortly. If you take along a cell phone, and are interested in getting that warning call - - just register online at: www.sceg.com/saludariver.

Safety Notes-

One of the habits that anyone who has ever flown an aircraft develops is the “preflight check”. This is a habit that boaters need to develop as well. This is particularly important for all boaters be you a sailor, “wake boarder” or fisherman.

Sailors! When did you last check that standing rigging? If your sailboat has a daggerboard, centerboard or swing keel there is rigging that controls the keel. This rigging can cause major damage if it fails.

Boaters! Before you leave the dock check **everything!** Check:

- Safety gear- life jackets, lights, fire extinguishers.
- Operations gear- batteries, steering gear and cables, throttle unit and cable, fuel lines and fuel tanks.

Outboard motors need at least annual maintenance as do the mounts, nuts and bolts, etc. that keep them attached to your boat.

A safety note to all who use a trailer- At least once every season anyone who tows a trailer should do the following checks:

- Check the wheels, tire condition and tire pressure.
- Remove the hub and check bearings.
- Jack up the axle, spin the wheel and check bearing noise and clearance.
- If the trailer has brakes check the brake fluid and brake action (do the brakes come on slow or fully stop the load).

To all who use the waters of Lake Murray, please think safety when boating, sailing, fishing or trailering.

Our very own **BIG** spider!!!

I recently had occasion to change a water flow to our fish pond. To do this I had to reach into a valve box buried below ground in our yard at our Lake Murray home. As I reached in to turn the valve I noticed a dark shadow on the valve. A closer inspection revealed the biggest spider I have seen since I have been in South Carolina. It was heavy bodied and about 2 ½ to 3 inches across. Needless to say I did not put my hand on the valve. I went to get some insecticide but by the time I returned it was long gone.



Now anyone who lives on the lake or uses the lake knows that spiders around water are a given. However, this one was definitely new to me. After a quick check on Google I was able to identify my visitor as the "Carolina Wolf

Spider" designated as "the official SC state spider" in 2000. This is the largest wolf spider in North America and one of the largest in the world. It hunts alone and gets its name because it runs down its prey instead of trapping it in a web. The females are 3 to 4 inches across and the males are a little smaller. They are agile hunters relying on their good eyesight for hunting at night.

You can use their eyes to find them at night because their eyes reflect light well and often seem green in reflected light. They are usually active March through October. Although not too aggressive they are very fast and should not be handled. All spiders carry some venom making a bite a dangerous situation.

Just another critter in the fascinating life around the lake!

SCE&G Holds 12th Quarterly meeting in the last 3 years.

The 12th Quarterly relicense meeting held by SCE&G was July 31st to discuss the Land Rebalancing Proposal by SCE&G for the remaining SCE&G owned future development properties.

Tommy Boozer, SCE&G Shoreline Manager discussed the proposed rebalancing plan that will be included in the new license. SCE&G is seeking a license for the next 30 to 50 years to continue operating the Saluda Hydro facility. This concerns property that is still owned by SCE&G within the property boundary line (PBL) as well some adjacent property they own outside the PBL.

Boozer explained The Lake and Land committee evaluated every unsold property owned by SCE&G and placed a number value on it from either an economic point of view or from a natural resource point of view. After evaluating the committee's work, a rebalancing plan was drafted by SCE&G.

The plan proposed was re-assessed by the Lake and Land Committee and after several adjustments were made, the chart below shows SCE&G's current proposal. Please note that approximately 900 acres have been taken out of future development and put in protected areas:

A few interesting facts about the Lake and Land Committee are:

- 20 members including agencies, NGO's (non governmental organizations) and homeowner groups participated.
- Over 40 meetings were held
- 225 pages of summaries and 1100 emails were generated.
- Over 7,000 man hours were used in just assessing this one committee of the relicensing procedure.

There were 6 other committees participating in this license. LMA participated in all areas of this procedure.

If you use Lake Murray, this plan will affect you, so please thank your LMA Board for participating in this very long and important process and encourage your neighbors and friends who use the lake to be a member of LMA.

Before the Dam

Back in the 1920's, the Saluda River valley was a peaceful farming area. Approximately 3500 people resided in the area. Although the soil was a hard red clay, the crops grew well. There were no towns only individual farms with homes. During this time most homes had a formal parlor used only for special occasions such as weddings and funerals. In addition, most farms had a special place on the property for a family cemetery.

In the late 1920's, the Lexington Water Power Company began purchasing land along the Saluda river and along the streams which fed into the river. About 100,000 acres were purchased at a price of \$90 per acre! A few people held out and received as much as \$125 per acre. A very few people totally refused to sell and a result there are some people today who still own land under the lake.

When dam construction started in 1927, most of the residents moved to new homes above the proposed new shoreline. The old homes and barns were demolished and the wood was used in the construction of new buildings. There are no old buildings under the lake today.

There are 193 cemeteries under the lake today. When the water started to rise, the families were given several choices. The families could have the remains moved to another location beyond the water or they could leave the remains where they were. In that case, the Power Company would place a concrete slab over the grave to prevent anything from floating. In some cases where this was done, a memorial marker was erected in another cemetery.

Today when the lake level drops to about 350', a few of these cemeteries become visible. One of these is on the Lexington side of the lake. Known as the Mount Pleasant Cemetery, It is located near Rawls Point. I believe there are one or two more which become exposed at low water levels on the Chapin side of the lake.

A SPECIAL FISHING SITE

Now this is a very special place to fish- but it isn't on Lake Murray! This special place is the Wildlife Management Area near Cordesville in Berkley County, SC. What is special about this place is that to fish the area adults and youths must fish together. This spring the area was opened to adult/youth public fishing through October 31st. Anglers 17 years or younger must be accompanied by at least two adults 18 years of age or older and adults are allowed to fish there only if they are accompanied by a youth. This is a great opportunity for families to enjoy the outdoors together. Now how special is that?

LAKE MURRAY OPERATING POLICY FOR FERC RELICENSING

The LMA recommends a minimum water level of 354 msl as an operation policy in the license agreement to be approved by the FERC. It is understood by the LMA that under emergency and extraordinary circumstances the lake could be lowered to 345 msl. This should be on rare occasions. Examples for lowering the lake are dam and/or downstream safety and for dam or equipment repair. Minimum water should be released when there is inadequate inflow to maintain the 354 msl such as during periods of extended droughts. Stakeholders around the lake should be notified and given the opportunity where possible to discuss the needs for deviating from the approved policy.

LMA Water Testing Program

LMA is halfway through the water testing for 2008. This is the 3rd year of testing by LMA and so far the results show that our lake is in good condition. We were especially interested in test results this year because for the first time since we started the testing program, the lake is full of water. Results show that in the upper part of the lake we still have high phosphorus levels during a month of heavy rain fall, which causes heavy runoff from agricultural areas in this part of the lake.

The accompanying graph shows that in the month of May, test areas H (Clouds Creek), J (Little Saluda River), and K (Bush River) were high for phosphorus content. During the month of May, Saluda and Newberry Counties had 4 inches of rainfall. In June and July rain fall was much lighter therefore, we think less rain, less run off means less phosphorus content. We have three additional tests scheduled for 2008. The next Lake Link will include all of the test results for 2008.
